It is no secret that today's cost of education is heading steadfastly toward the border of luxury. This situation seems to be pervasive in all areas of education. Be it a public institution or a private institution, the price tag has been consistently **heading north** yearly. Take for example the average cost of tuition, room, and board for U.S. private colleges. It topped \$25,000 per year in 2002, more than the price of a new Honda Accord or a Toyota Camry. Fortunately, the above analogy reflects only a clear-cut situation; in reality, the system does provide some mending to its own problems. The fact is, similar to car buying, most students don't pay the full sticker price for college. According to the U.S. College Board, more than three quarters of students at four-year private schools receive some form of financial assistance and three out of five students at public institutions receive financial aid. But financial aid doesn't fall out of the sky. You must learn where to find it and how to apply. The problem is that not everyone is eligible. And if you are ineligible, what are you going to do? Are there any alternatives? The answer is yes. As the old saying goes, "Where there is a will, there is a way." You can figure it out by yourself.

Cross Cultural Communications is the field of study which seeks to explain and resolve the problems, conflicts, and barriers that result from people of different cultures communicating with each other. One of the most tenacious cross-cultural communication barriers is language.

Most people assume that all cross-cultural problems associated with language stem from the fact that the two parties are speaking different languages. However, this is not always the case. People from England and the United States speak English, but the form of English used in these two countries contains some variations. It is now a generally accepted fact that American English is a separate language from British English. As a result of these different usage patterns, there are a number of misunderstandings which can occur when conducting a negotiation or chatting. Now imagine a person from England attempting to negotiate, in English, with a person from say, Brazil. Whether the two parties speak Brazilian Portuguese or British English, there are bound to be barriers created by the fact that at least one party is using a foreign language.

Most people acknowledge that finding an efficient method of communicating one's meaning as clearly as possible is only the first of many steps in resolving cross-cultural communication barriers. The hiring of interpreters, the studying of the language used in the discussion, and the use of translation software are a few of the available methods. Beyond this rather empirical first step, parties involved in a cross-cultural communication situation are well-advised to remember that patience and sensitivity are also critical to the success of the communication. A smile and

genuine interest in the other party's well-being are often more important than any other single factor.

The future of cross-cultural communication looks set to be one in which technology plays a greater and greater role. The technology already exists to convert speech from one language into speech in another, and companies like Microsoft and Google are frantically working to develop ways of making such communication technology more efficient and affordable. Still, whatever role technology may come to play in facilitating intercultural communication in the future, virtues like patience, tolerance and openness toward the other will surely remain paramount.

The ancient Egyptians are believed to have used a system of surveying the land that was developed through observation of the stars and the changing of the seasons. By watching the movements of the stars and attempting to set a standard that would roughly comply to that which they had observed, the Egyptians were able to construct massive monuments of surprisingly accurate proportions. The Great Pyramids of Ghiza are but one example of this application of standards derived from astronomical observations. Unfortunately, many records of that time have disappeared over the ages, so it is difficult for us to know exactly how they made their measurements. It is, nonetheless, obvious that by relying on the standards that they observed in nature, the Egyptians were able to build long-lasting quality architectural monuments.

The same principle of developing standards through careful observation is essential for modern engineers. For example, to determine the standard load a steel beam can support, it is necessary to identify the composition of the metal in the beam. Such observations are only possible with the aid of microscopic measuring devices. Once a standard has been established for the composition of the beam, further experimentation is performed to find the maximum stress the beam can withstand. Again, such tests are only possible through the development of machinery that can deliver measurable quantities of force. Skyscrapers and large bridges, just like the pyramids of ancient Egypt, can only be built after elaborate sets of standards have been developed.
